



1. Overview
  - a. Cryosurgery is a procedure that exposes skin lesions to extreme cold to produce cell injury and destruction. The term comes from the Greek words *cryo* (icy cold) and *surgery* (handiwork).
  - b. The most common skin lesions designated for removal by cryosurgical methods in children include: warts (*Verrucae*), *Molluscum contagiosum*, and other benign lesions
  - c. Options to cryosurgery for treatment of warts in children include duct tape, and salicylic acid patches.

  - b. To remove lesions causing discomfort
